OCIA – Symbolon Lessons 17 & 18: A Love That Lasts (Marriage)

Opening Prayer: Ephesians 5:25-33

Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ loved the church and handed himself over for her to sanctify her, cleansing her by the bath of water with the word, that he might present to himself the church in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish. So [also] husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one hates his own flesh but rather nourishes and cherishes it, even as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body. "For this reason a man shall leave [his] father and [his] mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." This is a great mystery, but I speak in reference to Christ and the church. In any case, each one of you should love his wife as himself, and the wife should respect her husband.

(1 Cor 13:1-7)

Now I will show you the way which surpasses all others. If I speak with human tongues and angelic as well, but do not have love, I am but a noisy gong, a clanging symbol. If I have the gift of prophesy and, with full knowledge, comprehend all mysteries, if I have faith great enough to move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give everything I have to feed the poor and hand over my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind. Love is not jealous, it does not put on airs, it is not snobbish. Love is never rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not prone to anger, neither does it brood over injuries. Love does not rejoice in what is wrong but rejoices with the truth. There is no limit to love's forbearance, to its trust, its hope, its power to endure.

• Questions for Discussion:

- How does the "world", and specifically our culture, portray "love"?

- Weekly Gospel Reading: Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (Lk 2:22-32)
